The Clean Energy DC Act

In 2019, Mayor Bowser signed one of the nation's most progressive clean energy laws.



100% renewable electricity by 2032

Implementing the Clean Energy DC Plan

Work has begun on 56 of 57 action items in the Plan.



EQUITY

In 2019, Solar for All and the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program reduced energy costs for nearly 30,000 District households.





BUILDINGS

Mayor Bowser awarded a \$400,000 grant to help launch the High-Performance Building Hub to advance the building industry's adoption of high-performing building practices. Buildings account for about 75% of city-wide carbon emissions and energy consumption.





CLEAN ENERGY

In 2020, the city's largest community solar installation—serving at least 750 households—will open on city-owned property near Oxon Run in Ward 8 with funding from Solar for All.





TRANSPORTATION

The DC Circulator operates one of the largest public electric bus fleets on the East Coast with 14 electric buses—14 more buses will be purchased in 2020.
